



Mexican-born artist Angel Axioma's artistic journey is shaped by his immigrant roots and interest in natural science. This composition study for his series, Patterns for Life, is made with cut symmetrical forms reminiscent of microscopic marine life as well as Mesoamerican hieroglyphics.

Paloma Barhaugh-Bordas works at the intersection of migration, queerness, and ecology. They created their cyanotypes and graphite rubbings from materials they found while walking in Mexico City, and used them to weave correspondences to women artists from previous generations.



This copper plate etching is from Alex Boeschenstein's ongoing body of work, $Visionary\ Rumor$, which is a multidisciplinary examination of the resonances between the Cold War nuclear complex and the UFO phenomenon.

Paige Booth's collage in pink, orange and yellow evokes the passage of time with the rhythm and repetition of days and recurring glorious sunsets.

Anahita (Ani) Bradberry is an Iranian-American artist and writer creating environments with plasma light. This work embraces opposites and contradictions, leaning into the notion that our foils help us know who we are.

For this sculpture with plasma light, Anahita (Ani) Bradberry spliced together clear and coated glass. The coated section glows bright green as the phosphorescent powder on the inside surface reacts to the electrified argon, while the clear sections reveal the pure blue hue of the plasma light made with the smallest amount of liquid mercury in the tube.

Pink Peonies 2024, Acrylic and gouache on canvas 30 x 24", \$1,100

By simplifying form and blending rich pinks with deep magentas, Indian-American artist Neena Buxani distills the emotional essence of beautiful pink peonies which are bright, alive, and full of possibilities.


I Was Looking Out Your Window 2022, Acrylic on wood 12 x 12", \$720

Valérie Chaussonnet's *Oh Mon Chou!* crocheted series is rooted in her nostalgia for the delights of picking and savoring pastries at a French Pâtisserie. This is a chocolate and coffee-themed tray for six friends... or just two.

Lisa Choinacky's minimal painting embraces the uncertainty of ink moving in water. Through the symmetry of forms, she conveys the connectivity of relationships.



This painting is part of Adrienne Hodge's ongoing investigation into the way we perceive shifting, nebulous entities.

This work is part of a series in which Lauren Jaben explores the interplay between minimal compositional elements and organic floral forms.



Rakhee Jain

Shooting Stars, Field Thistles + Gayfeathers 2020, Beeswax, dye on linen with encaustic and oils on wood panel $30 \times 40 \times 2.5$ ", \$1,000

Rakhee Jain reflects on how we use flowers in rituals and ceremonies. She gathered these wildflowers on pandemic walks. They represent uncertainties, but also moments of hope and joy amidst a seemingly chaotic world.

Roi James is intrigued by how, when confronted with mystery and uncertainty, one can find meaning and understanding. In his *Construct* series, he explores the formal elements of art by reducing compositions to their most simple forms to create works that are ultimately about transcendence, harmony, and order.

This piece is a contemporary interpretation of traditional Korean Buncheong ware. Using repetitive hand-carved linear patterns, the surface creates a subtle rhythm of light and shadow. The textured layers, achieved through slip application and precise incising, embody both restraint and elegance, evoking a distinctly East Asian aesthetic while reflecting the artist's personal sensibility.

For her series, Findings, Bethany Johnson forms multilayered sculptures that are reminiscent of geological formations which become a meditation on deep time and material metamorphosis.


